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Adoption Q&A

Can I continue to receive a subsidy for my adopted child after 18 years of age?

Yes, if your child was adopted at 16 years of age or older AND if he/she meets Extended Foster Care (EFC) eligibility requirements.

My adopted child is 18 and still in school. Can she still receive Medicaid?

Yes, if your child was adopted at 16 years or older, meets EFC eligibility requirements and receives the extended adoption subsidy, your child can continue to be covered by Medicaid.

No, if your child was adopted before 16 years old. You should receive a letter from the Louisiana Department of Health stating that your child is no longer receiving Medicaid through DCFS. Your child may apply for Medicaid on his/her own.

My child will be graduating high school and is applying for college, what financial aid and grants does he/she qualify for?

When completing the FASFA application, please check off the box stating that your child was in foster care.
