Verify your regular SNAP benefit amount

- Check the EBT card balance through CAFE (www.dcfs.la.gov/CAFE), the LifeinCheck mobile app or by calling 1-888-LAHelp-U (1-888-524-3578)
- Review customized letters from DCFS that contain benefit information

Review your info in case you're eligible for more benefits

- Has your household size increased?
- Are you facing higher costs for shelter, child care or court-ordered child support?
- Has your income decreased?
- Are you elderly or disabled with changes in your medical expenses?
